One page summary of a project idea/proposal

delivered its results and achieved its	
objectives. Who will <i>use</i> your

Collaborators – who might you need	
to work with to achieve your aims?	
How will the project go beyond the	
state of the art? Where will you take	
the field?	
How will the project develop your	
research career?	
How much will your project cost and

The one page summary is a tool used by researchers to develop research ideas into funding applications.

A well-crafted one-page summary provides a **concise overview** of an idea which can then be assessed, discussed and, where appropriate, developed into a full funding proposal.

You can use the summary to develop an idea for any type of funding application: network building; travel grant; seed funding; career development fellowship; mobility grant or an individual or collaborative project grant.

Sections should be no longer than a short paragraph (3-4 sentences). You do not need to populate every section. Address the sections that:

- are pertinent to your idea and the type of funding you will apply for
- help you to shape your idea and sharpen your rationale for pursuing it
